TMC's Covid-19 Response

At The Midwife Center, our midwives and nurses led our organization's plan to keep our clients and staff as safe as possible by quickly implementing critical safety policies as soon as the reality of the pandemic hit. TMC staff made thoughtful changes based on recommendations of the CDC, the Pennsylvania Department of Health and Allegheny County Health Department, and the American Association of Birth Centers. These changes included: limiting visitors, symptom screening everyone entering the building, additional sanitation efforts and use of PPE, transitioning some services to virtual platforms, including all of our behavioral health care and classes, and some gynecological, prenatal and postpartum visits.

TMC staff also added new and adapted existing services to meet changing client needs including:

- Making phone calls to clients in between prenatal visits to address concerns about Covid-19.
- Initiating a group Zoom meeting for clients in their third trimester to provide additional support.
- Dedicating more time to connect clients to community resources for financial and other help.
- Transitioning our innovative With Women Fridays walk-in gynecological program to a same day scheduling platform to increase safety measures while continuing to reduce barriers to care.

During the Year of the Nurse and the Midwife, we also celebrated several successes of our staff members:


- TMC's Associate Clinical Director Emily McGahey, DM, CNM earned her doctorate from Jefferson University.

Strategic Plan Update

The Midwife Center's 2020-2022 Strategic Planning Goal is: As a high-quality care provider in an environment with poor health outcomes and persistent racial disparity, TMC will increase its influence as a resource to clients of all ages, races, gender identities, sexual orientations, religions, and socioeconomic status while strengthening its personnel and financial position.



We are pleased to report the following progress on our goals as of the end of 2020:

- Financial Sustainability: Thanks to the generosity of new and long-time supporters, we met
 our fundraising goals for 2020. We also worked on a plan to increase earned revenue from our
 services.
- Staff & Board: TMC took important steps towards becoming a more competitive employer
 by completing a market salary analysis in partnership with the Bayer Center for Nonprofit
 Management. We also finalized our organizational chart with new positions created since
 our expansion in 2017, reconfigured call shifts for midwives and nurses, administered a staff
 satisfaction survey, and continued with DEI training for the staff and board.
- Programs: In order to ensure our programs have the most impact, we completed evaluations of several programs and implemented changes based on the evaluations. For example, we added more options for postpartum support groups, which experienced a 75% increase in participation in 2020.
- **Building the Pipeline**: Mentoring the next generation of birth center professionals has always been an important part of TMC's work, and we committed to expanding on that work with this strategic plan. A recent grant from the RK Mellon Foundation allowed us to hire our current Ruth Brexendorf Stifel Midwife Fellow Annetra Taylor, MSN, CNM, who started in May 2021. We also served as an internship site for many aspiring health professionals and hosted virtual educational programs (see page 8).
- Visibility: TMC continued to work towards influencing healthcare policies and practices by being
 included in local media and key meetings about reproductive health during the pandemic and
 pending legislation to expand access to midwives and birth centers.

The Midwife Center's mission is to promote wellness by providing exceptional, client-centered primary gynecological, pregnancy and birthing care in southwestern Pennsylvania's only independent birth center.

Our Programs & Services

Our team of state-licensed certified nurse midwives, registered nurses, and nurse practitioners provide comprehensive pregnancy, birthing, and primary gynecological care and educational classes for people throughout their lifespan. Local grants and individual donor support allow us to better meet the needs of our growing clientele.

Prenatal, Childbirth & Postpartum Services


In 2020, TMC had 403 babies born in the practice.

TMC provided:

- 3,880 prenatal visits
- 583 two-week and six-week postpartum visits
- 484 postpartum counseling calls

The Midwife Center Outcomes Statistics

The Midwife Center's outcome statistics, like birth centers nationally, continue to be significantly better than the national average, including during the pandemic:



Comprehensive Care

The Midwife Center staff continued to provide a variety of services during 2020:

- Primary GYN Care: The Midwife Center's nurse practitioners and certified nurse-midwives
 provided 1,903 primary gynecological visits, including annual exams, cancer screenings,
 contraception, STI screening and testing and care for gynecological problems, and 116
 colposcopies.
- **Behavioral Health & Wellness**: Our Behavioral Health Specialist Jul Bibro-Ruch, LSCW provided 783 behavioral health visits. She also facilitated weekly postpartum support groups for mothers and newborns, a program that experienced a 75% increase in participation during 2020.

- In-house Lab: Our Medical Assistant Jackie Stephanie and staff nurses provided 1,014 in-house lab services, including vaccines to protect against the flu and cervical, vulvar and vaginal cancers caused by Human Papillomavirus (HPV).
- **Lactation Support**: TMC nurses and lactation consultants provided lactation consultation appointments, donor-supported postpartum phone calls, and breastfeeding classes.
- Information & Resource Counseling: TMC staff provided hundreds of information & resource counseling encounters for our clients. These encounters included connecting clients with additional resources, like transportation, nutrition assistance, free diapers, smoking cessation program referrals, childcare, housing and health insurance.
- Diana Hull Prenatal Scholarships: TMC continued to provide scholarships to individuals and families with limited incomes to attend our childbirth education, breastfeeding and newborn care classes.







Community Education & Engagement

Throughout the year, The Midwife Center staff shared information with our community about the benefits of midwife-led care and helped mentor the next generation of reproductive healthcare providers. In 2020 TMC:

- Hosted two virtual "Lunch & Learn" series via Facebook Live. These sessions were developed and facilitated by TMC's Community Engagement Coordinator Devon Taliaferro and included topics such as: maternal health policy and birth center care with a focus on changes due to the pandemic presented by TMC's midwives; mental health during the perinatal period presented by TMC's behavioral health specialist; and what you need to know about insurance presented by TMC's medical billing manager. The fall series included sessions about how to become a midwife, nurse, lactation consultant and doula and received more than 5,000 total views.
- Hosted a record 13 advanced practice provider students for clinical placements from various universities and two nursing students from the University of Pittsburgh.
- Provided educational presentations to several local high schools and universities.
- Hired two Ruth Brexendorf Stifel Fellows, DeJané Dozier, MSN, CNM and Jessie Holmquist, DNP, CNM, as permanent staff midwives.


